Answer: blank Pass: blank

Comments: We also start with a blank page.

2. In his diary, an Englishman wrote about his disillusions and felt terrified about his way back, while a Norwegian claimed he could sacrifice everything for the revival of the Englishman. Write the last name of any of them.

Answer: Amundsen.

Pass: Scott.

Comments: it is about the members of the first expeditions to the South Pole. Scott was the second and died on his way back.

3. The Spaniards say that the Guadalquivir river length is shorter than its other parameter. What is this other parameter?

Answer: name.

Pass: hydronym, toponym.

4. Ancient China was known for its tradition to take the books outside to dry every seventh day of the Seventh Moon. This was done to remove all bookworms, if any. There was also a tradition to take the clothes outside to protect them from IT. Name IT.

Answer: moth.

5. The paper about the fifth part of *Heroes of Might and Magic* game says that the developers of the fifth part created a very complicated world, and its history has been created and re-designed for a long time. What is the name of a military commander the developers of the fifth part of the game took for a model, as the author of the paper believed?

Answer: Alexander III of Macedon

Pass: Alexander the Great, Alexander, of Macedon.

Comments: the authors of the paper likened this complicated world with the Gordian knot which, as the legend goes, was just cut into pieces by Alexander III of Macedon.

6. At the end of XX century, the Italians did as follows: if a Football Championship was broadcasted on TV, one region in Italy was not covered with a broadcasting service. What is this region?

Answer: the region which hosted the Football Championship.

Pass: synonymous answers.

Comments: the idea is that the viewers went to the stadium rather than stayed at home in front of TV.

7. In a cartoon named *The Hercules*, it could be seen that the skin of the Nemean Lion, in fact, belongs to IT. It means that Hercules cheated and didn't kill the lion but found a dead body left by hyenas. Name IT.

Answer: Scar.

Comments: from *The Lion King* cartoon. It was killed by hyenas.

Comments: it can be called a Trumpburger.





Round 4. Truth or Lie

Comments: it is called Hold the button. There could be other similar software and apps.

Answer: Lie.

Comments: it didn't happen. In 1993, Michael Jackson was given a present in Moscow, but that was a saber but not Yeltsin's signature.

7. Military activities of Hayreddin Barbarossa as an Ottoman corsair contributed into a wide popularity of henna dye in the Southern Europe.

Answer: Lie.

Comments: we made it up. Hayreddin Barbarossa was not a merchant but a naval commander. And the Medieval Muslims saw no use in colouring their women with henna dye.

Round 6. Seven Hints

Guess a well-known person with the least number of hints. Each hint is followed by an answer. The right answer after the first hint gives 7 scores, after the second hint – 6 scores, and so on up to the seventh hint and 1 score. A wrong answer after any hint does not reduce the scores. Only the first answer out of all right answers given by the teams counts.

7 scores. 9 years, 9 months, and 15 days passed after HIS death, when an asteroid was discovered and named after HIM.

6 scores. This is also the name of one airport in Europe.

5 scores. HE could create an alive copy of a cat in one famous movie.

4 scores. HE was born in a place which used to belong to Austria.

3 scores. This is also the name of one of Si Units.

2 scores. A fall of the Tunguska meteorite was rumored to be caused by HIS experiment.

1 score. HIS father and grandfather were the Orthodox priests. HE seemed to be named after the Saint Nicolas.

Answer: Nikola Tesla.

Pass: Tesla.

Comments: In *The Prestige* by Christopher Nolan, Tesla invented something similar to a copying machine for objects and living creatures. The village of Smilyan, the Motherland of Tesla, used to belong to Austrian Empire. Tesla is also a measurement unit for magnetic field induction. What is more, the airport in Belgrade is called Nikola Tesla.

Round 7. Final Round

Most questions contain texts, but there are a couple of questions with images. Every right answer gives 2 scores, every wrong answer reduces 2 scores, "No answer" does not change the score.

1. A Canadian student Robertson found out that a spheroid is poorly managed on a plane and replaced it for a cylinder by cutting the odd parts. What do we call such a cylinder?

Answer: puck.

Pass: a hockey puck.

Comments: this is how an ice hockey appeared in one of the Universities in Canada. In terms of Stereometry, a puck is a cylinder, although its height is significantly small in comparison with the base.

2. In one joke, Splinter suspected that his friend had wasted all the money on online games. What is the name of his friend?

Answer: Donatello.

Comments: Splinter is an instructor of Ninja turtles. The author emphasizes the name's resemblance with a word "donate" meaning spending money to support something, e.g. online games.





Here is an advert of a detergent on an element of THIS OBJECT. What do people do while being on THIS OBJECT?

Answer: they cross the road.

Comments: this is an advert of Mister Proper which is placed on one of the line in a pedestrian crossing. On the screen:



4. A hero in a book titled *Alone* started to experience some mixed feelings about the plot of Jules Verne's book, especially when the characters were described as very enthusiastic about their inventions and discoveries. Name this book.

Answer: The Mysterious Island.

Comments: A hero of the book was alone on the island and had to survive, unlike the heroes of Jules Verne who managed to discover new things, invent things, and feel the joy of life.

5. When he was young, he got acquainted with Pablo Picasso, installed a phone with Franz Kafka as his assistant, worked as a driver and met Hemingway. Name the state which is in his nickname.

Answer: Indiana.


Comments: these adventures are described in *The Young Indiana Jones Chronicles*.

6. In war time, an editor of one newspaper published the image of a huge beard of his acquaintance on the wide white pages instead of the articles. What was the profession of the owner of this huge beard?

Answer: a censor.

Comments: newspaper materials were very often censored. The editor was trying to say that was the place for an article, but it was banned.





We hid two English words. Guess the English word which is one letter longer.

Answer: landscape.

Comments: the first Gallery shows the portraits, while the second one - landscapes. The Gallery buildings matches the page orientation — portrait (vertical) or landscape (horizontal).
